2025 Alumni of Merit Award Winner:

Jim A. Engler, Jr. '84

Now at the helm of Engler Electric — a family-run business for over a century — Jim A. Engler, Jr., is the third-generation owner to guide the company forward. His journey began at MVCC, where he earned his Electrical Engineering Technology degree in 1984. But for Engler, MVCC was far more than a steppingstone to a career.

“Beyond the textbooks and lectures was a community that believed in potential — even before I fully believed in my own,” Engler says. “The faculty and staff didn’t just teach; they mentored, encouraged, and challenged me. My fellow students inspired me, each with their own stories and struggles. And somewhere between those late-night study sessions and early morning classes, I discovered who I was and who I wanted to become.”

Under his leadership, Engler Electric has built a strong reputation for its commercial and industrial electrical contracting work, including significant projects at local institutions like Utica University, Colgate, and MVCC. Engler also serves as President of the Finger Lakes Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA), representing 52 member contractors and serving as a management partner to IBEW Local 43.



He played a pivotal role in establishing a partnership between MVCC, IBEW Local 43, and NECA that created a formal education pathway for IBEW Local 43 members. Historically, upon completion of the NECA/IBEW Local 43’s five-year earn-and-learn training program, apprentices became recognized journey workers but did not earn portable college credits. Through this collaboration, apprentices now receive both a journey worker card and an MVCC AOS degree at no cost — a SUNY-recognized credential that opens doors to the future.

Through his professional leadership and community involvement, Engler exemplifies a commitment to excellence, innovation, and service.

“MVCC gave me more than an education — it gave me a foundation. It taught me resilience, the power of perseverance, and the importance of giving back.”

Engler’s impact has been recognized nationally. He was honored as a Fellow of the Academy of Electrical Contracting, NECA’s highest national distinction, becoming only the second Fellow from the Finger Lakes Chapter in the past 80 years. His contributions extend to the broader community, including involvement with the Utica Rotary Club and Community Foundation.



2025 Distinguished Alumni Award Winner

Monalisa Fermin-Fennell '99

has dedicated her life to public service and community advocacy. Her commitment began at age 13 when she became a youth leader with the 280 Dreamers and Police Athletic League in New York City, promoting girls in sports and leading community fundraising efforts.

Fermin-Fennell began her academic journey at MVCC, earning an associate degree in Liberal Arts & Sciences: General Studies. As a student, she served on the Latino Club's executive cabinet and helped build connections between the Utica Academy of Science Charter School and MVCC. After earning a bachelor's degree in Sociology from SUNY Institute of Technology, she started her career in New York City, rising to Facility Director at LifeSpire.

Since returning to Utica in 2010, Fermin-Fennell has deepened her commitment to community advocacy through organizations such as Bridging the G.A.P., United Way, MVHS Patient & Family Advisory Committee, Utica Civilian Public Safety Advisory Board, Mohawk Valley Latino Association, and UCP. She now works as Quality Improvement Manager with ICAN. She was recognized with a New York State Senate Commendation Award, presented by Senator Joseph Griffi in 2023.



2025 Young Alumni Award Winner

Taryn Rackmyer '18, '19

who holds degrees in Public Policy and Accounting from MVCC, has built a distinguished career in public policy and advocacy. Currently Director of Education Policy at the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities, Rackmyer previously worked as a Government Relations Specialist for SUNY and a lead fiscal analyst for the New York State Senate Majority Leader.

An advocate for women's empowerment, Rackmyer is Vice President of the YWCA of the Greater Capital Region Board of Directors. After the overturn of Roe v. Wade, she was selected as one of 11 advisors to YWCA USA's Reproductive Justice Task Force and served as a delegate to the United Nations' 2024 Commission on the Status of Women.

At MVCC, Rackmyer was an active student leader, serving as a peer tutor, Phi Theta Kappa member, Student Government Treasurer, and SUNY Student Assembly Coordinator of Campus Engagement. She received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence in 2019. She went on to earn a master's degree in Public Policy & Management from the University at Albany.

Rackmyer also served as SUNY's inaugural Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Fellow, advancing work on affordability, access, racial and social justice, mental health, and food insecurity across all 64 campuses.



Memphis Brannum '20

Computer Aided Drafting

Engineer, Andela Products

After years focused on raising her family, Memphis Brannum decided to return to college to prepare for a new career. She enrolled in the Computer Aided Drafting program at MVCC, where she took advantage of the range of resources and support services available to help students succeed at every stage of life.

Through extensive hands-on learning and guidance from knowledgeable, supportive faculty, Brannum gained the technical skills and real-world experience for a rewarding career at Andela Products in Richfield Springs, N.Y., which designs and manufactures innovative glass-recycling equipment and systems. In her role, Brannum helps communities and industries transform waste glass into valuable resources, contributing to a more sustainable future.

"The education and hands-on experience I received at MVCC helped me gain confidence, learn technical skills, and have the critical thinking mindset I use every day in my work," she says. "MVCC didn't just prepare me for a job — it prepared me for a future in a growing and sustainable industry."

Austin Cornacchia '17

Civil Engineering Technology

Senior Engineer, City of Utica

Before graduating from MVCC's Civil Engineering Technology program, Austin Cornacchia had already launched his career with the City of Utica as an inspector on construction projects.

"Working under engineers at the city showed me that education is definitely the key to success," he says. "The coursework provided by the faculty, along with their great contacts throughout the community, gave me a great education and helped me get a job before I even graduated."

Cornacchia went on to earn a bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering Technology from SUNY Polytechnic Institute. That credential helped him advance from inspector to junior engineer and now senior engineer, managing multiple projects and mentoring junior team members.

"The teachers at MVCC are always willing to go above and beyond to help you succeed," he says. "Without them, I wouldn't be where I am today."

Business Management

Director, Civil Service Administration for Oneida County

After beginning college as a student-athlete focused more on sports than academics, Brian Jweid eventually faced a series of setbacks that led him to leave school altogether. When he was ready to return, he found a fresh start at MVCC.

“When I realized I needed my degree, MVCC was there with open arms,” says Jweid, now Director of Civil Service Administration for Oneida County.

After graduating from MVCC, Jweid transferred to SUNY Polytechnic Institute, where he earned a bachelor’s degree in Business Administration. He explored several career paths before taking a civil service exam that opened the door to a position with Oneida County as a personnel technician. In 2018, he was promoted to his current role, which allows him to give back by supporting students, the public, and anyone interested in public service.

“MVCC wasn’t just a chapter in my life,” Jweid says. “It was a launchpad that helped me get back on track to where I am today.”

Liberal Arts & Sciences: Mathematics and Science

Academic Advisor, SUNY Polytechnic Institute

As a first-generation college student, Mya Kyaw initially began navigating her experience without much guidance. “But from my very first placement test to starting classes, everyone at MVCC was very welcoming and supportive,” she says.

Kyaw thrived at MVCC, excelling in her studies while actively involved on campus. She worked as a student assistant and peer tutor in the Learning Commons, served as President of MVCC’s Lambda Beta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, and was a member of CSTEP.

After graduating, Kyaw transferred to Binghamton University, where she earned a bachelor’s degree in Biological Sciences. She is now on track to complete her master’s degree in Public Health at Boston University School of Public Health.

“I couldn’t be prouder of how my journey started at MVCC,” she says. “It gave me the foundation to lead, to belong, succeed, and grow.”

Drafter/Designer, National Grid;
Owner, Visionary Vending

While attending MVCC from 2012 to 2015, Julius Blackshear, Jr. embraced every opportunity to learn and grow. While earning his AOS degree in Computer Aided Drafting, he also took courses in Civil Engineering Technology — a combination he says was instrumental in launching his career. Those programs prepared him for his first role as an engineer trainee with the Department of Transportation and paved the way for his current position as a drafter/designer at National Grid. “Those two curriculums helped me get where I am now with my career,” he says. “Being at MVCC was a blessing because it was affordable, allowed me to stay home, save money, work, and get a good education.”

In addition to his technical studies, Blackshear took several business courses, gaining skills that proved unexpectedly valuable when he launched his own business during the pandemic — Visionary Vending, which has been operating for five years with machines located in Utica and Syracuse. “I’m thankful that MVCC has helped me get to this point in my career and my business.”

Witnessing how mental health challenges shaped children's behavior sparked a deep interest in psychology and inspired her to shift her academic focus.

With encouragement from her advisors, Rosic began taking psychology courses at MVCC, helping her gain clarity about her future. The transition set her on a new trajectory, supported by a campus community that helped her build confidence, strengthen her writing, and discover her passion for helping others.

After graduating from MVCC, Rosic earned a bachelor's degree in psychology and is now in her third year of a master's program in Mental Health Counseling. She currently works as a long-term care social worker at Sitrin Health Care Center, helping individuals with a wide range of mental health needs.

"I'm grateful for MVCC because it has led me to choose a career I am dedicated to today," she says.

Donna Felitto dedicated 37 years of exceptional service to MVCC's Athletics and Physical Education Department, becoming a warm and reliable presence for students, staff, and visitors. Known for her teamwork and willingness to support departments across campus, she also contributed

behind the scenes at athletic events and Foundation initiatives. Outside MVCC, she helps run Light-It-Up Sauce, her family's local specialty sauce business. Felitto's professionalism and commitment earned her multiple honors, including two MVCC Excellence in Classified Service Awards and the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Classified Service.



Jim Fiore

Professor Emeritus Jim Fiore served MVCC for more than 40 years, teaching across Electrical Engineering Technology, Engineering Science, and Verizon programs. A leader in curriculum development and ABET accreditation, he also created the popular Science of Sound course. Fiore is widely

Building the future: MVCC breaks ground on \$49M Applied Technology Center

On Monday, Sept. 22, 2025, MVCC broke ground on its new Applied Technology Center (ATC) — a two-story, 63,760-square-foot facility designed to prepare the region's future skilled workforce. Rising on the footprint between Payne Hall and Jorgensen Center at the Utica Campus, the ATC will enhance MVCC's science and technology programs and help address critical workforce shortages in both established and emerging STEM fields.

The building will feature advanced laboratories, modern classrooms, and flexible collaboration spaces, supporting transformational learning for students, employer partners, incumbent workers, apprentices, and pre-apprentices across the Mohawk Valley and New York State.

Made possible through funding from Oneida County Executive Anthony J. Picente, Jr., the Oneida County Board of Legislators, the State of New York, SUNY, the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE), and Fabmatics, the ATC was designed by MARCH Associates Architects & Planners. Construction — led by Beebe Construction and Murnane Building Contractors, Inc. — is expected to be completed by late December 2027.

"The Applied Technology Center will empower our students to succeed in high-demand science and technology fields while meeting the workforce needs of our region," said MVCC President Dr. Randall J. VanWagoner. "This project is a true partnership, and we are deeply grateful to Oneida County, the State of New York, SUNY, and Fabmatics for their generous support, and to Senator Schumer for his leadership with the FIPSE program. Together, we are investing in the future of our students, our community, and the economy of the Mohawk Valley."





Specialized Labs

With 16 industry-standard labs — including an Automation Training Center, Mechatronics & Robotics Lab, Welding Lab, HVAC Lab, and advanced chemistry and engineering labs — students will have access to equipment and spaces that mirror the private sector.

Flexible Learning Spaces

Students will benefit from a variety of new learning environments, including three first-floor classrooms, two meeting rooms, breakout spaces, and a multipurpose collaboration area with retractable partitions.

Striking, Sustainable Design

Highlights include a double-height lobby with dramatic feature stairs, glass front labs, and connection between the mass timber “head” and steel-framed “shed” sections. Sustainable design elements significantly reduce the building’s carbon footprint:

- Envelope exceeds the NYS energy code by 9%
- LED lighting for long-term efficiency
- Advanced materials to reduce environmental impact

MVCC Raises Nearly \$62,000 through MV Gives

In September, the MVCC Foundation participated in the Community Foundation's fourth annual Mohawk Valley Gives campaign, raising a total of **\$61,569** in support of several key initiatives. Thanks to the generosity of donors and supporters, the Foundation also secured the full \$15,000 1:1 match provided by an anonymous donor, doubling the impact of most gifts made during the campaign. Funding helped to support:

- **The Sandy Cummings Student Engagement Scholarship (\$7,500)**, bringing the fund to full endowment.
- **A new Dental Hygiene Scholarship (\$10,890)** for students in MVCC's upcoming Dental Hygiene program, with the goal of fully endowing the fund before program launch.
- **The College's Laptop Loaner Program (\$8,179)** to purchase new laptops for students in need.

- **Community Education Summer Program Scholarships (\$3,050)**, expanding access to summer enrichment programs for local youth.
- **Fashion Design Program Scholarships (\$1,000)** for students pursuing careers in fashion design.
- **Miscellaneous Scholarships (\$950)** to help students fund their education.
- **ON-Ramp (\$30,000)** to strengthen short-term workforce training and career-readiness programs.

After battling through a tense, weather-challenged tournament week, the Hawks faced Dallas College-Richland in their third straight championship matchup. MVCC overcame an early deficit to force overtime and a 1-1 draw, sending the game into a dramatic penalty-kick shootout. Key conversions by Francesco Tagliavini and Souayibou Diop, paired with exceptional goalkeeping by Anderson Costa Filho secured the Hawks' second consecutive national title and solidified their standing among the NJCAA elite. Dominic DiMaggio, Men's Soccer Head Coach and Director of Athletics, was named NJCAA Region III Athletic Director of the Year. And for the second consecutive year, MVCC's Jen Krohn was named NJCAA Region III Athletic Trainer of the Year — the first to receive back-to-back honors.



Men's Basketball wins first-ever National Championship

The 2024-25 season marked a defining moment for Men's Basketball, as the Hawks captured the program's first-ever NJCAA National Championship. MVCC defeated No. 10 seed Salem Community College, outlasted No. 3 seed Minnesota State in a high-intensity semifinal, and secured the national title with a strong victory over No. 5 seed Herkimer College. Freshman Andre Pasha of Syracuse was named NJCAA Region III Male Athlete of the Year.

Women's Soccer wins sixth straight Regional Championship


The Women's Soccer Team captured its sixth consecutive Region III North A District Championship. Entering the post-season as the No. 4 seed, the Hawks delivered a commanding 3-0 upset over top-seeded Onondaga to secure the regional crown and earn their seventh straight trip to NJCAA National Tournament — one of the longest active streaks in DIII Women's Soccer. While the Hawks fell short of a national title, their post-season run reaffirmed MVCC's position as one of the NJCAA's most consistently competitive programs.

MVCC participates in Self-Study process for reaccreditation

MVCC is currently conducting its Self-Study as part of the College's eight-year institutional reaccreditation cycle, with an on-site evaluation scheduled for Spring 2027.

What is accreditation?

Because colleges operate with significant autonomy, accreditation provides an external check on quality. Institutional accreditors evaluate all aspects of a college — academic programs, student services, governance, planning, and more — and determine whether it meets established standards. Accreditation confirms that MVCC maintains high-quality practices and can continue its accredited status.

Why is accreditation important?

Accreditation assures students, families, and the community that our programs meet vigorous standards. It also allows MVCC to offer federal financial aid, as the government relies on accredited status to verify institutional quality.

Who is MVCC's accreditor?

MVCC is accredited by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE or "Middle States"), a U.S. Department of Education-recognized accreditor since 1952. MSCHE accredits over 500 institutions, including all SUNY campuses. Its evaluation is based on seven standards:

- Mission and Goals
- Ethics and Integrity
- Design and Delivery of the Student Learning Experience
- Support of the Student Experience
- Educational Effectiveness Assessment
- Planning, Resources, and Institutional Improvement
- Governance, Leadership, and Administration

Together, these standards ensure every part of the College advances student success and operational excellence.

What is the Self-Study process?

MSCHE's eight-year accreditation cycle culminates with an evaluation team visit. Leading up to that visit, the College completes a Self-Study report demonstrating how MVCC meets each Middle States standard. This self-evaluative process helps identify both strengths and areas for improvement, ensuring MVCC continues to grow and serve students efficiently.

More than 90 employees from all departments serve on Self-Study working groups, supported by many others who provide evidence or participate in interviews. Two co-chairs guide the overall process, and each of the seven standards has its own co-chairs and working group. These teams gather evidence, assess institutional effectiveness, and write the report that will inform the evaluation team's visit in Spring 2027.

The process is ongoing — look for more updates as we move close to our accreditation review.
